The Greater Memphis IT Council Launches Women in Tech Peer Group Memphis Leads the Nation in Diversity in the IT Sector

MEMPHIS, TENNESSEE – March 22, 2023: The Greater Memphis IT Council (GMITC) has formalized a Women in Tech peer group in recognition that Memphis leads the nation in the representation of Women in IT and Minorities in IT as measured by the annual CompTIA Cyberstates Report for the second year. (2021 and 2022).

To celebrate this leadership position for Memphis, GMITC will host a Women in Tech Luncheon on March 22nd with AutoZone SVP & CIO Michelle Borninkhof as the keynote speaker. The luncheon will bring together women leaders from the GMITC membership, the IT community and partner organizations supporting women and young girls in STEM initiatives.

The primary focus of the Women in Tech peer group is to build supportive relationships for female professionals working in the IT and technology sector. In this spirit, GMITC has reached an affiliate status with the National Center for Women and Information Technology (NCWIT), a non-profit community of more than 600 universities, companies, non-profits, and government organizations nationwide working to increase women's participation in computing and technology.

GMITC Women in Tech will also focus on mentoring young women and girls to develop their interest in the field and to help aspiring females navigate career pathways. GMITC will partner with CodeCrew, The University of Memphis Girls Experiencing Engineering (GEE) Program and Girl Scouts Heart of the South through the East High School T-STEM Academy troop.

The Greater Memphis IT Council was founded in 2014 and has demonstrated a strong commitment to diversity equity and inclusion (DEI) from its inception. From programming to Board of Director representation to the composition of the GMITC membership, GMITC has built a model organization with DEI as a core focus.
